**AQUARIUM OF THE PACIFIC TO EXPAND WITH
OPENING OF NEW “GREEN” BUILDING AND EXHIBITS**

Media are invited to get a sneak peak at the new watershed environmental exhibition, classroom, and native landscaping garden on Thursday, November 12, 2008 at 10 a.m.

Aquarium of the Pacific will be 1st aquarium in the U.S. to open a carbon-neutral building

WHAT: The Aquarium of the Pacific will be expanding its visitor space with a new “green” area, which will provide vital information for guests of all ages to help California deal with its impending water crisis. The media is invited to the press preview on Wednesday, November 12, 2008 to get a sneak peak at the new *Our Watersheds: Pathway to the Pacific* area, which opens to the public on November 15, 2008. The new space includes an interactive environmental exhibition, classroom with a “green roof”, and native landscaping garden. The Aquarium of the Pacific will become the first aquarium in the nation to have a carbon-neutral building. The Aquarium’s new classroom is also expected to be the first in Long Beach to receive the highest “green” building rating: Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design (LEED) platinum-certification.

A shaded outdoor area will feature five displays on local watersheds, including a three-dimensional model of the Los Angeles and San Gabriel watersheds with various interactive features such as the option to create rain and see what happens once rain lands on our mountains and streets. Hands-on exhibits will demonstrate the practical and environmentally friendly ways in which we can live more sustainably with nature and its resources. The exhibits will define a watershed, illustrate the local watersheds, and explore concepts of water supply and use. Surrounding the classroom and outdoor exhibits, native landscaping will represent the flora found in the Los Angeles and San Gabriel Watersheds and illustrate how native gardens can significantly reduce water use.

The Aquarium is open daily from 9 a.m.-6 p.m. (closed Dec. 25, 2008 and in April for the Grand Prix).
